

## Districts 1 and 7 are up for Election in 2026

Heartland Power Cooperative is member-owned and governed by a board of directors elected by you, the members. Two Board of Director positions will be up for election in 2026: District 1 (currently represented by Roger Solomonson) and District 7 (currently represented by Tricia Jaeger).

The Nominating Committee has begun seeking candidates from these districts to run for the Board. To be considered, candidates must be Heartland Power members listed on the membership card. If only one name is listed, a joint membership can be added.

Candidates must also live at and receive electric service from the cooperative at a location within the district they wish to represent.

## Winter Preparedness

**Tips to Prepare Before a Winter Storm or Power Outage** 



#### **During An Outage:**

Keep freezers and refrigerators closed. Disconnect appliances and electronics to avoid damage from electrical surges.



#### **Preventing Fires:**

Keep flammable items away from heat sources. Always plug space heaters directly into an outlet. Use smoke alarms.



#### **Use Generators Safely:**

Generators and fuel should always be used outdoors and at least 20 feet from windows, doors, and attached garages.



## Be Prepared On The Road:

Test your battery, check tire tread, and use deicing fluid. Always keep your fuel tank full and add a winter survival kit.



#### **Keep Your Devices Charged:**

Keep devices charged to stay connected and informed.

## COZY COMFORT FOOD

## **Breadsticks**

Recipe submitted by Janelle Reiff of Elma

#### For The Breadsticks:

- 1½ cup warm water
- 1 T. yeast
- 1 T. vegetable oil
- 1 T. sugar
- 1 1/4 tsp. salt
- 4 cup flower

#### For The Butter Mixture:

- ½ cup butter, melted
- 3 T. olive oil
- · 3 T. parmesan cheese
- 1 tsp. garlic
- · 2 T. dried parsley



Dissolve yeast in water. Add oil, sugar, and salt. Stir in flour until it is too stiff to stir with a spoon. Place on a floured surface and knead several minutes. Put into lightly greased bowl. Let rise until double-about 1 hour. Punch down and press into a jelly roll pan. Spread butter mixture on top and bake at 350° for 15-18 minutes or until golden brown. Cut in slices and dip into hot pizza or cheese sauce.

## **Disconnected Service/Idle Service Policy**



Services may be temporarily disconnected at a member's request, however if the member requests the service be reconnected within the next 15 months, they will be charged the minimum bill service charge for the months the service was disconnected and a \$60 reconnect fee. Services that are not connected at the end of the calendar year will be notified as they must pay a \$48 fee to have Heartland Power maintain the service in a state of readiness for the next calendar year. If the service is reconnected during the year, the member will receive a \$4 credit on their bill for each month that service is active for the year.

If the member elects not to pay the idle service charge, Heartland Power may remove the service at any time. Once the service line has been removed, removal costs and construction costs to rebuild the service line may be charged to the member to reinstall the service. Please contact us if you have any questions regarding this policy.

## Facility Charge Increase Effective January 1

The Heartland Power Cooperative Board of Directors recently approved an increase in facility charges for rural residential, farm, and small commercial rate classes. The decision was based on a thorough cost-of-service study conducted by the cooperative's rate consultant.

The new facility charges will take effect on January 1, 2026. For rural residential, farm, and small commercial members, the facility charge will rise by \$3. Specifically, single-phase charges will increase from \$47 to \$50, while three-phase charges will go from \$67 to \$70.
